The Connecticut Chess League expects to be entertained in the near future by Weaver Adams, New England Chess Champion. The exhibition may be held in Middletown.


The Niantle Chess Club is considering having an exhibition by Samuel Reshevsky in the early spring. More about this later. Game Selection.

Problems. It is a simple matter to break through a line of pawns as shown in last week's problem. White advances the middle pawn. black plays RPxP, white advances his Bishop pawn. If black plays BPxP, white advances the Rook pawn, White wins if the black king is far from the scene of action.

This week's problem, by O. Wurzburg, is taken from "More White Rooks," and this should give clue to the solution. White to mate in four moves.
