

Edmund A. Roman, 64, of 29 Blake Rd., former chairman of the Fire Board and active in Republican politics for many years, died yesterday at New Britain General Hospital.

A native and lifelong resident of New Britain, he was employed as a supervisor at the Fafnir Bearing Co., retireing two years ago after 38 years' service.

He served as Fire Board chairman from 1954 to 1956 under Mayor Edward B. Scott.

Mr. Roman served as chairman of the former 14th Ward for 25 years and held membership on the Republican Town Committee. He was a past president of the Polish Republican Federated Clubs of Connecticut.

He was a member of Holy Cross Church, the Holy Cross Holy Name Society. Oaks Club, Falcon Nest 88, Polish Political Club No. 1, New Britain Chess Club, Connecticut Chess Club and Mannatuck Rapid Readers Assn.

Mr. Roman is survived by his wife, Mrs. Anna (Melecsinsky) Roman; two sons, Edmund J. New Britain Chess Club may be without a home today, following an incident that came to light yesterday.

John Markow, commander of the Gen. Haller Post, Polish World War Veterans, said he would know tonight whether the club will be prevented from using the hall in the future.

Mrs. Thomas Reeven, wife of the man who was not allowed into the half last week to vote in the Connecticut State Chess Assn. public elections, said she believes the chess club was evicted from using the half by officials last night.

To Meet Tonight

Markow was unable to attend last night's session because he is recovering from minor surgery.

He said he will meet with other officials tonight on the matter.

The incident began when Reeves, who is a paraplegic and confined to a wheelchair, was denied entrance to the club to vote in the state chess club elections.

He is a member of the New Horizons Chess Club.

Markow reported today that Reeves may have attempted to get in after receiving false information from the mayor's office.

"Somebody from the mayor's office told him (Reeves) that everything was okay and that I

would let him in," Markow said.

Call not Received

He never received a call from the mayor's office, however, and would not have let Reeves in anyway, Markow contended.

He explained that the Haller post held its 50th anniversary two years ago.

Two men confined to wheel— of chairs planned to attend the our caremonies, but when Markow called the club's insurance— agent, he learned that a nurse— would have to accompany each— wheelchair victim and a doctor— would have to be present at all— times, Markow said.

Reeves had attempted to enter the hall six months ago to compete in a chess match with the New Britain Chess Club, but me was denied entry also because of insurance problems.

Complaints Filed

The Gen. Haller Post hall is just not equipped to accommodate wheelchair victims and if anything were to happen, the insurance would not cover damages, Markow stated.

We of the New Horizons Chess Club would like all to know we back Tom Reeves concerning the Haller Post incident.

Four handjeaps, an attorney from New Britain, a worker at the Electric Bost Yard, and a woman were all turned away six months ago at a chess club meeting. We are proud that none of our walking friends forsaked us and left our club to join the New Britain Chess Club, one of the best in Connecticut — player wise.

When we were humiliated at the door six months ago. I wrote to them at that time and said I was sorry I was Polish. They were words of anger — because I am proud to be Polish. They were the first group to oppose Adolph Hitler and gave time for the free world to arm themselves, though defeated by two great powers.

Also, my roommate has been carried up over 30 stairs to the Polish Falcogs Hall a number of years ago, and been to other Polish clubs, up 20 stairs to the old building at the Pride of Connecticut Lodge of Elks. Bristol Elks, Knights of Columbus. New Britain, VFW Post, New Britain, Polish National Home, and many, many others.

Tom Reeves represented our club at a New Britain Chess Club meeting, which was the Connecticut State Chess Federation Chapter meeting to elect officials. The veterans of Haller Post deserve to have a private club—it is America! However, when you rent out the hall for weldings, dances, showers, and a chess club—are you private? We went to the New Britain Chess Club. Were not there any disabled Polish War Veterans, and why can't they get into Haller Post?

If the New Britain Chess Club is evicted, is there another club in New Britain that will sponsor them? If they aren't evicted, they probably have to do some soul-searching. If a paraplegic that lost the use of his legs in Korea or Vietnam is refused entrance, what will Mr. Markow seav?

The good part of being handicapped is meeting people of all colors, nationalities and religions — you become friends and there are no barriers!

Upon entering Tom Reeves' home, you notice over 25 trophies he received in stock and race car driving. He has not won one yet in a chess match. Unless be travels to another city — he may not ever get one!!
