# NB Chess Club reelects Strazdins

Arkadijs Strazdins, president of the New Britain Chess Club, scored 16½ against 18 players simultaneously this past Dec. 7. Joseph Manisigian wen the only game, and Wesley Frazier the only draw.

Strazdins comments that this exhibition has been the smallest he had ever hosted. He estimates at least 80 simuls since his emigration from Germany in 1952. In 1949, his largest simul had over 50 players (Germany) and the largest here in the U.S. was in 1969 when 48 players came to New Britain. Strazdins says that this observation of low turnout is consistent with all other key indicators that chess is experiencing a slump.

dicators that chess is experiencing a slump. The New Britain club's paid membership list has fallen to 53 players from 119 when Fischer was champ in 1973

Arkadits plays his simuls very rapidly, and this has no negative effect on his games, he always wins all but two or three games. His speed is hampered by arthritis in his knees, which has gotten worse since 1956. Most simultaneous givers will agree that the most important requirement for these exhibitions is a pair of good sturdy legs. Arkadijs has adjusted to the pain which he must endure.

The simul-giver usually has the white pieces on all boards, and players are required to make their move when he arrives

quired to make their move when he arrives at the board. Strazdins has always allowed players their choice of color, and is very generous with issuing passes (letting a player skip a lap or two to think).


