SOUTHINGTON — On Saturday at G. Fox and Co. Centinel Hill Hall in Hartford, 145 of the top scholastic chess players in the state subjected themselves to eight hours of grueling competition in hopes of capturing the title of state champion in their respective grade.

Kurt Holyst, who at 1904 was the highest rated player at any grade level, dominated the Grade 9 play from the onset and captured his fifth consecutive individual state championship.

In Connecticut scholastic competition since 1978, Holyst has compiled a perfect 47-0 record and has captained winning teams in both the doubles and four man team com-

JH player

Rodney Charest, the number two seeded junior high school player in the state captured his third second place individual championship in four years. His only defeat came after a two hour struggle with Holyst.

Another of Southington's premier players and one of the top ranked speed chess competitors in the state, Chris Dearing, won third place in the 12th grade section. He compiled a 3-1 record and came close to taking second place. It was Dearing's best scholastic tournament in three years.

Others who participated and did well in their respective sections were: John Laliberte, 3-1; Jody Holyst, Mike Barmore and Dan Michaud, 2-2; Brian Beal and Ed Morris, relative newcomers to tournament chess, contributed two victories to the Southington cause.

Over all Southington was represented by nine players in the state competition and was the best represented of any

school in Grades 8 through 12.

Chess teams win titles

SOUTHINGTON Southington's delegation to the Connecticut Scholastic four man chess team competition in Hartford on last week rewrote the scholastic record books. The competition was sponsored by the Connecticut Chess Federation and directed by Fred Townsend.

The junior high school team captained by Kurt Holyst and consisting of Rodney Charest, Joseph Carrier and John Laliberte scored a perfect 4-0 in match compettion. Although this in itself was a commendable accomplishment it was overshadowed by the

fact that each player had a perfect 4-0 individual score. The final tally of 16-0 established a new record for scholastic junior high team competition in the state

It was the second straight team championhip for Southington who took the title from Bloomfield in

The high school team cap-tained by Chris Dearing and consisting of Andrew Zapatka, Mike Barmore and Dan Michaud quickly asserted itself in its first contest against Bloomfield and never looked back.

In its second match it defeated the 1981 state champions, North Haven. Dearing defeated Phil Pan, the 1982 individual 12th grade state champion and Zapatka drew Charley Mcphedran the 1981 11th grade state champion. Dearing ended the tournament with a 3-1 record while Zapatka had 4 draws and no losses for a 2-2 score.

Barmore scored a perfect 4-0. Only four other players in the entire high school section accomplished that feat.

Dan Michaud, who lost his first two games, fought back to defeat his last two opponents in games that ultimately decided Southing-ton's fate. Southington ended the contest with a 4-0 match score and coupled this with the junior high school victory to be the first town in Connecticut history to have a junior high and high school state championship team in the same year.

Strazdins wins city chess championship for 29th time

Twelve qualified players from primary play competed for the 32nd annual New Britain city chess championship finals, a single round robin, a U.S. Chess Federation (USCF) rated tournament at the Quartette Club. Competitions were held each Tuesday night for the past three months.

Arkadijs Strazdins finished first with a score of 91/4-11/4. This was the 29th time that Strazdins, a chess master, has won the city championship. He first won in 1952. In 1973 he shared the title with Robert W. Lane; in 1974, with Pierre LeClerc, and in 1979, with Paul Ligas,

The only times that Strazdins did not finish first or tied for first, were in the New Britain championship in 1976 and 1981 when Robert Milardo, one of Connecticut's top chess experts,

Strazdins' victory did not come easy. In the first round he lost to Kurt J.

Holyst, a Kennedy Junior High School student in Southington, who is Connecticut's top rated junior player with a USCF rating of 1,904. He drew with Milardo in the third round. then scored eight points in the last eight rounds, pulling out a 1/2-point margin of

Holyst took second place honors with 9-2. His only defeats came from Eric J. Godin, 1979 Connecticut cochampion, and Milardo.

Godin took third place with 81/2-21/2. Defending champion Milardo was fourth with 8-3 and Paul Wooster, fifth with 7-4.

In 1936 I beat Weaver Adams in a qualifying round in the first annual U.S. Championship tournament (prior to that date the champion held his title until a challenge match could be financially arranged; sometimes it took several years for this to happen.) Adams, the author of several chess books, was one of the tournament.
