NEW BRITAIN — The 18th annual New Britain city chess championship reserve open tournament (part of the annual championship tournament), a five-round Swiss system U.S. Chess Federation (USCF) rated, will start tomorrow at 7:30 p.m. at the Quartette Club, 225 Wooster St.

It is open to all, but participants must be or become members of the USCF.

Trophies will be awarded to the top three. Also, if in each Class — A, B, C, D, E and Unrated — there are four or more, the top player in that class will be awarded a trophy. Also, the biggest upset prize, a one year subscription to the Massachusetts chess magazine "Chess Horizons" will be awarded.

All official USCF rated tournament games at the New Britain Chess Club (NBCC) start at 7:30 p.m. The time limit is 40 moves in 90 minutes for each player; then if needed, sudden death 30 minutes (each player).

Early registration shows that 28 New Britain area players have signed up including chess veteran expert players Basil R. Greenough, William V. Dworski, Zdzislaw Jankowski, Karl H. Kochman and Arkadijs Strazdins, all of whom played in New Britain tournaments in the early 1950s.

Also, playing, will be Robert R. Kozlowski, a 10-year-old Holmes School student who is 1988 Connecticut elementary school champion.

STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

NEW BRITAIN - The 18th annual New Britain city reserve open championship, a five-round Swiss system, U.S. Chess Federation (USCF) rated 28-player event played Tuesday nights at the Quartette Club, has

been completed.

Four tied for first place with scores of 4-1. In a tie-break, Arkadijs Strazdins of New Britain was the winner over Robert Milardo of Middletown. Walter Pajek of New Britsin was third and 1984 champion Lawrence T. O'Neill of Berlin,

Strazdins, who has won the city championship 30 times since 1952, and Milardo four times, played for the first time in this reserve event.

Strazdins in the second round was upset by Thomas R. Fillion of Southington and Milardo in the third round by Zbigniew Jurkowski of New Britain. Going into the last round O'Neill was the sole leader with four points. He was pitted against Strazdins and lost the game after four hours of play. Pajak was the only player in the tournament who was undefeated. He won three and drew two games.

CHESS OLYMPIAD

In the 28th world team men's and 13th women's chess Olympiads, played recently in Thessaloniki. Greece, the United States team in the 14-round Swiss system event scored 34-22 out of 56 possible points to finish in a fourth place tie with Hungary.

The Soviets captured the gold medal with a score of 40:5-15.5. England took the silver after a tie-break, and Holland won the bronze, each

with 34,5-21,5.

The American woman scored 23.5-18.5 out of 42 possible points to finish in ninth place tie with Holland.

Hungary took the gold medal with

a score of 33-9.

For the first time since the Soviet women competed in the Olympiads, they didn't win the gold medal. The Soviets took the silver with 32.5-9.5. Yugoslavia took the bronze medal, 28-14.

More than 150 countries participated in the Olympiad with most of the world's best men and women chess players, the largest ever to take part.

However, Bauer is Connecticut champion, and the title and accompanying trophy is reserved for a resident of Connecticut. Bauer, a NBCC member, won the state championship in 1983, 1984 and 1988.



NEW BRITAIN — World Chess Champion Garri Kasparov, 26, will give a clock simultaneous chess exhibition against top players of the Harvard Chess Club, as well as to IBM computers, Saturday from noon to 5:30 p.m. at Harvard's Sander Theater, Harvard University, Cambridge, Mass.

After the exhibition, there will be a question-and-answer session for the audience. Throughout the simultaneous exhibition, analysis of the games by top grandmasters will progress in the adjacent Memorial Hall.

General admission is \$15 at the door. This is the first time Kasparov has visited New England, and is the first time any reigning world champion has come to this region.

On Sunday, the first annual Harvard Chess Cup, a tourney matching five top United States chess grandmasters, Boris Gulko of Massachusetts, Maxim Dlugy and Ronald W. Henley of New Jersey, Lew Alburt and Michael A. Rohde of New York, will play against five top computers in Memorial Hall from 1 to 7 p.m. Introductory remarks will be made by Kasparov and experts in computer science and artificial intelligence. Both events are sponsored by the IBM Corporation, Saitek Industries Ltd., Spinnaker Software, and the American Chess Foundation, with support from Metro-West Chess Enterprises, The Games People Play and Leavit & Peirce.
