NEW BRITAIN — Twelve qualified expert players from the 30 players qualification tournament from last year competed for the 1993 43rd annual New Britain city chess championship finals, an 11-round single-round-robin U. S. Chess Federation (USCF) rated event at the Quartette Club.

Competition were held Tuesday nights for the past 13 weeks. John A. Baclawski of New Britain finished first with a score of 10-1, winning nine games (one by forfeit) and was able to save two games by drawing in the first round with Arkadijs Strazdins of New Britain, and with Robert Milardo of Middletown in the eighth round.

Baclawski has been a New Britain Chess Club (NBCC) member since 1972. In 1976 he won the Connecticut state amateur open championship, and in 1984, the NBCC championship.

Boleslaw A. Gryboski

NEW BRITAIN - Boleslaw A. Bill" Gryboski of Fairway Dr.,

New Britain. died at home today follow-ing a lengthly illness. He was 91.

The eldest son of Joseph and Margaret (Deptula) Grzybowski,

was a native and life-long resident of New Britain. He is survived by a son and daughter-in-law, Dr. William and Dr. Joyce Gryboski, formerly of New Britain but cur-rently of Tequesta, Florida, and East Lyme, Connecticut, and by a son, Dr. Robert A. Gryboski of Farmington. Surviving grandchildren include William, Thomas and Dr. David, all of Atlanta Georgia, Robert Jr. of Boston, Massachussetts, Elena, Melanie, and David. of Farmington. He is also surwwed by a loving brother, Edward Grey of New Britain and by many meces and nephews. He was predeceased by Marie, his wife of 64 years who died in March 1993; by a son, Robert who died in early childbood; by brothers, John, Ladislaus, Anthony and Albert; and by a sister, Genia.

Mr. Gryboski graduated from New Britain High School, class of 1930, Bentley School of Accounting and Finance, and Northeastern University. While attending Northeastem, he was elected President of Kolo Studentow Polskich w Bostonie, a socially active and politically influential organization of Polish-American College and University students in the Greater Boston area

Gryboski spent his entire professional career in the New Britain Banking Community, first at City National Bank as director of the foreign exchange department, and later for 35 years at the New Brit-ain National Bank from which he retired in 1966 as Senior Trust Officer. He also served for many years on the Board of Directors of the People's Savings Bank of New Britain and was Secretary of the Mutual Loan Company, which was liquidated in 1956.

He was a founding parishioner of Holy Cross Church and during the 1920's was chairman of the committee of Sacred Heart Church parishioners which successfully petitioned then Bishop Nilan for permission to separate from Sacred Heart and establish Holy Cross as a second Polish-American Roman Catholic parish in New Britain. He was a former Trustee of Holy Cross Church, a former officer of many of its societies, and an active parishioner until physically incapacitated

by his recent illness.

Gryboski was a former president of the Polish Businessmen's Association and a former secretary of Nest 88 of the Polish Falcons of America. He also served for many years as director of the combined citizenship class of the Falcons and the Polish American Political Club. In this capacity he helped many Polish immigrants become voting American citizens, thus contributing significantly to the ethnicity which was characterized New Britain politics for the past half-century. He was also a founding member of the 44 Club and proudly remained an emeritus member of that organi-

zation until his death.

Gryboski enjoyed a long and active career in New Britain politics. During the administrations of Mayors George Quigley and Angelo Paonessa he served two terms as alderman from the old fifth ward, representing the Broad Street neighborhood, the "hill", and the entire northwest section of New Britain. Because of controversy surrounding his activism in challenging the authority of Monsignor Lucyan Bojnowski, pastor of Sacred Heart Church, be seeking to establish a separate Polish-American parish, Gryboski was denied subsequent election as alderman, but continued to serve for many decades as Treasurer of the Republican Party of New Britain, retiring from that post when elected City Treasurer in 1960 on a slate headed by former Mayor, Honorable Thomas Meskill.

A former president of the New Britain Chess Club, Gryboski actively competed in state and regional tournaments during his younger days and was continually ranked among the top ten chess players in Connecticut during the late 1920's

and early 1930's.

Two share state's 'blitz' chess title
