The exhibition will be held next Tuesday (Jan. 11) at the Quartette Club, 225 Wooster St, starting at 7:30 p.m. Bauer, 38, with 2,347 U. S. Chess Federation rating points, is the third highest rated chess player in Connecticut and first-rated at the 72- member NBCC. He is one of the top 20 chess masters in New England. Bauer will play against all challengers simultaneously. Contestants can choose either white or black pieces, and will be allowed three passes. The first player who beats Bauer will be awarded a surprise Bauer has given simultaneous exhibitions at the NBCC nine times, with 197 players participating. He has won 144 games, lost 19 and drawn 34. The entry fee is \$4 (\$3 for students and senior citizens). Late entries will be accepted the night of competition by Arkadija Strazdins,

### Chess club slates tournament

NEW BRITAIN — The 23rd annual New Britain City Chess Championship reserve open tournament — a five-round Swiss system USCF-ruted — will begin Jan. 25 at 7:30 p.m. and continue Feb. 1, 8, 15 and 22, at the Quartette Club, 225 Wooster St.

The event is open only to members of the USCF, and to anyone who becomes a member at the registration.

All official USCF-rated tournament games at the New Britain Chess Club start at 7:30 p.m.

The time control is 40 moves in 90 minutes per player, then, if needed, 30 minutes sudden death.

NEW BRITAIN - Arthur Belliveau, noted local artist and retired

businessman, died March 14, 1994.

NEW BRITAIN - Arkadijs Strazdins of New Britain is the winner for the 31st time since 1952 of the City Chess Championship, held by the New Britain Chess Club (NBCC). He won the annual event by defeating nine players and drawing with two.

Second place went to James Bolton of New Haven, 81/2-21/2. Third place was won by Robert Milardo of Middletown, 8-3. Michael Sheroff of Farmington, the tournament director, was fourth at 61/2-41/2.

Dennis Tortora of Waterbury won the recent Open Chess Champion-ship held by the NBCC. He won with a score of 5-10 including one forfeit. Twenty-three players parti-cipated. Timothy F. Corey of Newington won second place on a fiebreaker over Joseph Rodriguez of Hartford. Both scored 41.

The NBCC will begin its 44th annual individual championship tournament on May 3 at the Quartette Club, 225 Wooster St., at 7:30 p.m. David C. Lunden of New Britain is the defending champion.

Kerry J. Leahy, a national chess master, gave a simultaneous exhibition April 19 at the Quartette Club. Seventeen players participated, with Leahy winning seven, losing two and drawing in eight, It took Leahy about four hours to finish all the games. He lost to Sib. S. Ray of Newington and Michael Zidbeck of Middletown.

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Twelve people played in this round-robin (all play all) competition with 11 rounds.
