Now, I'm not an expert on computers. I've run several different ones programmed to set type. Neither am I an expert chess player. But were I a mulitmillionaire, I would be willing to bet a few million that no computer would ever be made that could think.

Finally, if anybody is interested, I have an idea that would enable someto program a computer to be unbestable at checkers.
