

# State chess players honor city club presider

NEW BRITAIN - Arkadijs Strazdins, 75, president of the New Britain Chess Club (NBCC) since 1970, was honored recently at the Connecticut Chess Players banquet at the Prospect Cafe, West Hartford.

David J. Aldi, president of the Hartford Chess Club, presented awards to the winners of the Hartford Chess Club championships.

Besides recognizing Connecticut chess players who contributed to chess, a special award to presented to Strazdins by Robert Milardo, U.S. Chess Federation (USCF) delegate, for outstanding contributions to U.S. chess since 1951 in New Britain and Connecticut.

Speaking at the event were national senior master Richard N. Bauer, national chess masters Kerry J. Leahy, Michael Casella and Edward J. McHugh, former Connecticut Chess Association president Rob Roy, and long-standing NBCC members Milardo, Michael L. Sheroff and Robert W. Wolf.

After the awards presentation, the Arkadijs Strazdins Testimonial Blitz Tournament (five-minute games) was played.

Bauer of Wolcott and Casella of Middletown tied for first place with a score of 10% out of a possible 14 in Section A, and Leahy of Southbury took third place with 10-4 points. Strazdins, a Life Blitz Master, was unable to play due to the flu.

Section B with a score of 11-2, and Joseph C. Mansigian of New Britain

took second place with a score of 9-5.

The NBCC Christmas Open Blitz Tournament was won by Casella with a score of 181/2-11/2. Leahy finished second with 17-3, and Bauer, third with 15-5.

The NBCC and the Quartette Club will co-sponsor the first simultaneous exhibition of 1998 on Jan. 13 at 7:30 p.m. at the Quartette Club, 225 Wooster

Edward F. McHugh of West Suffield, Dennis Himes of Hartford won a national chess master, will play simultuneously against all challengers. McHogh, with 2,273 USCF rating

points, is the seventh-highest rater player in Connecticut and the fourth at the NBCC. McHugh is the Connecticut 1994-1996 Blitz champion.

McHugh will allow challengers choice of color and three passes. The entry fee is \$4, or \$3 for students and seniors 65 or older. A chess book donated by the NBCC will be awarded to the first player who defeats the master. Players may register the night of the competition between 7 and 7:25 p.m., with John C. Pasco, NBCC tournament director.

Arkadijs Strazdins, president of the New Britain Chess Club, was the quest of honor at this year's Conn. Chessplayers' Banquet in West Rartford. David Aldi of Sputhington started this annual event in 1994 to present awards to winners of his club tournaments in West Hartford.

This year, Kerry Leahy helped organize the banquet and testimonial to Stranding for his 40+ years service to Conn. Chess. More than 40 attended the buffet, presentation of awards, & the speed-chess tournament that lasted past midnight.

#### 6.. News from the New Britain Chess Club

Eighteen chessplayers competed against National Master Eric Godin in a simultaneous exhibition at the New Britain Chess Club. Hermann Zickfeld of Southington was the first to score a win against Godin, and won a chess book.

Godin allowed his opponents choice of color and three passes. Two others scored a win against Godin: Sib Ray of Newington and Melvin Ayola of New Britain. Only one player managed a draw with Godin: John Pasco of New Britain.

Nineteen chessplayers fought against National Master Kerry Leaby of Southbury in a simultaneous exhibition at the New Britain Chess Club. Leaby defeated six of the players, lost only one (to Russell Berube of Plantsville) and drew twelve. Many players got automatic draws when time ran out (more than four hours) and games were not finished.

Leahy allowed his opponents choice of color and many passes. This was Leahy's last simultaneous exhibition at the New Britain Chess Club, as he has accepted a new job in another state. He was the sixth ranked player in Conn. for 1997.

At the New Britian Chess Club Michael Casella won the Christmas Blitz Championship with 18.5 points out of a possible twenty. Kerry Leahy Finished second with 17 points, Rick Bauer third with 15 points, and International Master Jose De La Cruz of Waterbury in fourth place with 13.5 points.

The first tournament in 1998 will be the New Year's Blitz Tournament on January 6. A simultaneous exhibition will be performed by National Master Edward McHugh on January 13. #### Bauer chess tourney wins

NEW BRITAIN — National senior chess master Richard N. Bauer of Wolcott has won the 1998 48th annual New Britain City Chess Championship. He also won the event in 1990, 1992 and 1996.

Twelve qualified expert players from preliminary play competed in the tournament, a single-round-robin, U.S. Chess Federation-rated event.

Bauer came in first with a score of 10½-½, winning 10 games and drawing in the 10th round with the 1996 champion, life master James M. Bolton of New Haven.

Robert Milardo of Cromwell took second-place honors with a score of 0-2. He was defeated by Bauer and Dennis Tortora of Waterbury.

Bolton was third at 7½-3½. Tortora edged out Robert E. McDaniel of Tariffville on ticbreak points to take fourth place. Both scored 7-4.

Other results were:

6th, Arkadijs Strazdins of New Britain (32-time champion);7th, Michael L. Sheroff of Farmington; 8th, John C. Pasco of New Britain; 9, Jose De La Cruz of Waterbury; 10th, Lawrence T. O'Neill of Berlin; 11th, Russell Berube of Plantsville; 12th, Sib S. Ray of Newington.

Cash prizes were awarded to the top five. The prize for biggest upset, a chess book, was awarded to O'Neill for defeating, in the last round, Strazdins; who is

ed to O'Neill for defeating, in the last round, Strazdins, who is rated 43J USCF points above him. The event was co-sponsored by the Quartette Club and the New Britain Chess Club, and directed by Pasco and Tortors.

The match was last played in 1975, at Storrs. The NBCC team won by a score of 15-6.

He scored 3½ out of a possible 4 points in the four-round Swiss system U.S. Chess Federation (USCF)-rated event.

John Peasley of New Britain was second in a tie-break over Russell Berube of Plantsville. Both scored 3-1.

The prize for the biggest upset, a chess book donated by the NBCC, was awarded to Peasley, for upsetting a strong player rated 280 USCF rating points above him. Dennis Tortora directed the event, with assistance from Pasco.

Michael Casella of Middletown (formerly of New Britain) took the state title, with a score of 28.5 points out of a possible 34. Casella also is the current state regular champion. Paul Gregor of New Haven finished second with 28-6 points. Defending champion Edward F. McHugh of Suffield was third with 27.5-6.5 and Kerry J. Leahy of Southbury fourth, with 27-7. Richard N. Bauer of Wolcott and Harris B. Appelman of W. Simsbury tied for fifth place with a score of 26.5-7.5.
