National senior master Richard N. Bauer of Wolcott will play simultaneously against all challengers. Bauer, with a peak of 2,437 U. S. Chess Federation rating points, is one of the top New England chess masters.

Bauer will allow opponents to choose either white or black pieces, and will allow three passes. The entry fee is \$4, or \$3 for students and seniors 65 or older. (NBCC members pay \$1 less) A chess book donated by the NBCC will be awarded to the first player who defeats the master. Contestants may register the night of the exhibition with Arkadijs Strazdins, NBCC president, between 7 and 7:25 p.m. Spectators are welcome free of charge.

City Championship

The first round of the 49th annual New Britain city chess championship finals, a single round-robin, U. S. Chess Federation (USCF) rated tourna-

ment, will begin Jan. 19 at 7:30 p.m., and continue for successive Tuesday nights at the Quartette Club.

Grzesiak, Strazdins co-champions of open reserve chess tournament

NEW BRITAIN — William B. Grzesiak of Avon and New Britain Chess Club (NBCC) president Arkadijs Strazdins are cochampions of the the 1999 28th annual New Britain City Open Reserve Chess Tournament.

Each scored three wins and two draws in the five-round U. S. Chess Federation (USCF)-rated event.

The championship was decided in the last round when Strazdins was pitted against life chess master James M. Bolton of New Haven.

Strazdins, playing with the black pieces, needed a victory to win the title alone, but after a hard-fought battle the game ended in a draw. Three players scored 31/4-11/4, and the tie-break system decided their standings:

3rd, James M. Bolton;

4th, Karl H. Kochman of South Windsor;

5th, Robert E. McDaniel of Tariffville.

The top class prize winners were Kochman (B) and Jozef Madej of Unionville (C), scoring 3-2.

The biggest upset prize, a chess book, was awarded to Kochman for defeating Bolton, with 484 USCF rating points difference.

The tournament ended Feb. 23, with 18 players participating.

The event was co-sponsored by the Quartette Club and the NBCC, and directed by John C. Pasco and Robert R. Koslowski, USCF-accredited club tournament directors.


